# Lesson: Fishing for abalone

### Phase of learning

Years 5 - 6, Years 7 - 8

#### **WA Curriculum**

### **Summary**

In this lesson, students will consider the impact of overfishing and investigate the recreational abalone fishing rules.

#### **Outcomes**

- Students will reflect on their own ideas and opinions about characters and events.
- Students will consider the way that language and images are used to create character and influence emotion.
- Students will consider the effect of human impacts, in particular overfishing.
- Students will understand how scientific knowledge is used to solve problems and inform personal and community decisions.

#### **Duration**

45 minutes

### Preparation

This lesson is part of a unit of work on the text Blueback. It assumes some previous study of the text has already been completed. View the full Unit <u>here</u>.

Students will require a copy of Student worksheet: <u>Abalone fishing rules</u> and will need access to the internet in order to complete.

## **Steps**

- 1. Blueback introduces students to the concept of overfishing through the character Costello.
- 2. Discuss with your students -
  - How do they feel about Costello's character?
  - How is a commercial fisher different to a recreational fisher? (A commercial fisher is
    fishing for a commercial purpose i.e. to sell their catch. Recreational fishers catch for
    their own personal use and are not permitted to sell their catch.)
  - Do they think that fishing activities should be regulated? (i.e. should there be fishing rules in place?)
  - What sort of rules should be in place?
  - What does the term sustainability mean and how do fishing rules help with the sustainability of a species?
- 3. Provide students with Student worksheet: <u>Abalone fishing rules</u> and direct them to the <u>Fisheries website</u> to find out the recreational abalone fishing rules.
